ORDINANCE NUMBER 42.

AN ORDINANCE EXTENDING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEER RIVER, IN ITASCA COUNTY, MINNESOTA, TO INCLUDE A TRACT OF LAND ADJOINING SAID VILLAGE, TO-WIT: "WRIGHT'S ADDITION TO ITASCA CITY," SITUATED IN LOT 5, THE UNPLATTED PORTION OF LOT 5, "SEAMAN'S FIRST ADDITION TO ITASCA CITY" SITUATED IN LOT 8; AND THE UNPLATTED PORTION OF LOT 8, ALL IN SECTION 26, IN TOWNSHIP 145 NORTH AND RANGE 25 WEST.

The Village Council of the Village of Deer River, in Itasca county, Minnesota, do ordain as follows:

WHEREAS, The majority of the owners of the platted and unplatted lands herein described abutting upon the said Village of Deer River, not exceeding two hundred (200) acres so abutting, have petitioned the Council of the Village of Deer River to have the said lands included within the said village, which petition has been granted;

BE IT THEREFORE, ENACTED AND ORDAINED:

SECTION 1.--That the boundaries of said Village be and the same hereby are extended as to include, and that the Village include the following described land abutting upon said Village, to-wit: The platted portion of Lot 5, being "Wright's Addition to Itasca City;" the unplatted portion of Lot 5; the platted portion of Lot 8, being "Seaman's First Addition to Itasca City;" and the unplatted portion of Lot 8, all being in Section Twenty-six (26) in Township One Hundred Forty-five (145) North and Range Twenty-five (25) West of the Fifth Principal Meridian, in Itasca County, Minnesota, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the southeast corner of said section 26, thence north along the east line of said section 26 to the 1/4 section corner between sections 25 and 26 in said township, thence west along the north line of Lot 5 aforesaid to the northwest corner of said Lot 5, thence south along the west line of said Lots 5 and 8 of said section 26 to the southwest corner of said Lot 8, thence east along the south line of said Lot 8 to the point of commencement, forming one contiguous tract and containing 74.20 acres, more or less.

SECTION 2.--That this ordinance will be in force and take effect on its publication and the filing of a certified copy thereof in the office of the Secretary of State of Minnesota.

PROCLAMATION.

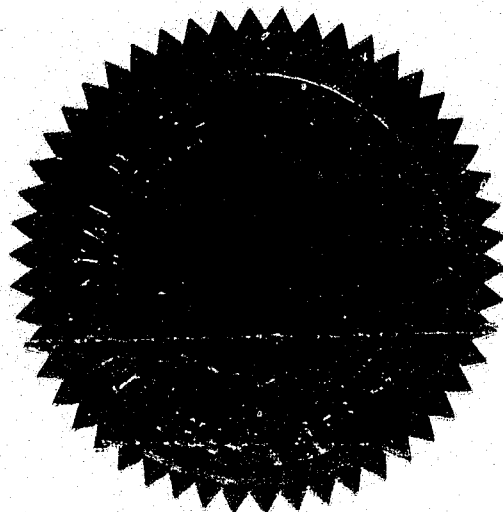
