COMMUNICATION FROM THE GOVERNOR.

STATE OF MINNESOTA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. St. Paul, April 18, 1927.

Hon. John A. Johnson, Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Sir: I am returning herewith, without my approval, House File No. 848, "A bill for an act to fix the compensation of judge of the probate court in the State of Minnesota, in counties now or hereafter having a population of not less than 240,000 inhabitants."

This bill was passed on the assumption that Senate File No. 137, A bill for an act to amend subdivision 22 of Section 252, General Statutes of 1923 relating to the salary of District Judges," would become a law.

In view of the fact that I felt it necessary to withhold my signature from Senate File No. 137, I do not feel that I could approve this bill, which, since my veto of Senate File No. 137, would make the salaries of Probate Judges of the Counties affected \$1,200 in excess of those of the District Judges serving the same Counties.
