#### **APPROPRIATION AMOUNT: \$197,000**

#### **Overall Project Outcome and Results**

A 42.5-acre conservation easement acquired through this project protects the 55-acre environmentally and historically significant Arcola Mills site (May Township, Washington County). The Environmental and Natural Resources appropriation acquired almost 20% of the \$1 million easement value (2003 appropriation: 7.29 acres and 2005 appropriation: .85 acres) and leveraged a 50% easement value contribution by the landowner, 10% value locally contributed by Washington County, and another 20% through Metro Greenways state bonding funds.

Arcola Mills – with ½ mile of St. Croix River shoreline within the St. Croix National Scenic Riverway – features spring-fed pools and 5 high quality cold-water brooks – home to brook trout and a new genus of aquatic macro-invertebrate recently discovered at Arcola Mills. It is a state site of biodiversity significance for its high quality native plant communities and context within the landscape. Several listed species (cattail sedge, American ginseng, Louisiana waterthrush, and trumpeter swan) are documented at Arcola Mills. Also, a 2005 Audubon survey found several DNR Species of Greatest Conservation Need: Eastern Wood-Pewee, Ovenbird, Prothonotary Warbler, Blue-winged Warbler, Golden-winged Warbler, and Canada Warbler.

Acquisition of the conservation easement assures that none of the site's natural resources will be lost to development and provided funds to the Arcola Mills Historic Foundation to enhance resource interpretation and conservation at the site.

Appropriation Language: (b) Metropolitan Area Wildlife Corridors \$2,425,000 the first year and \$2,425,000 the second year are from the trust fund to the commissioner of natural resources. \$3,550,000 of this appropriation is for acceleration of agency programs and cooperative agreements with the Trust for Public Land, Ducks Unlimited, Inc., Friends of the Mississippi River, Great River Greening, Minnesota Land Trust, and Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge Trust, Inc., for the purposes of planning, improving, and protecting important natural areas in the metropolitan region, as defined by Minnesota Statutes, section 473.121, subdivision 2, through grants, contracted services, conservation easements, and fee acquisition. \$500,000 of this appropriation is for an agreement with the city of Ramsey for the Trott Brook Corridor acquisition. \$800,000 of this appropriation is for an agreement with the Rice Creek Watershed District for Hardwood Creek acquisition and restoration. Land acquired with this appropriation must be sufficiently improved to meet at least minimum management standards as determined by the commissioner of natural resources. As part of the required work program, criteria and priorities for planned acquisition and restoration activities must be submitted to the legislative commission on Minnesota resources for review and approval before expenditure. Expenditures are limited to the identified project areas as defined in the work program. This appropriation may not be used for the purchase of residential structures unless expressly approved in the work program. Any land acquired in fee title by the commissioner of natural resources with money from this appropriation must be designated: (1) as an outdoor recreation unit under Minnesota Statutes, section 86A.07; or (2) as provided in Minnesota Statutes, sections 89.018, subdivision 2, paragraph (a); 97A.101; 97A.125; 97C.001; and

97C.011. The commissioner may so designate any lands acquired in less than fee title. This appropriation is available until June 30, 2006, at which time the project must be completed and final products delivered, unless an earlier date is specified in the work program.

### **Final Results:**

A 42.5-acre conservation easement acquired through this project protects the 55acre environmentally significant Arcola Mills site in May Township, Washington County. The Environmental and Natural Resources appropriation acquired almost 20% of the \$1 million easement value. Arcola Mill's included ½ mile of St. Croix River shoreline within the St. Croix National Scenic Riverway. The site features spring-fed pools and seeps emerging out of bedrock bluffs that feed 5 high quality cold-water brooks entering the St. Croix on the property which are home to brook trout and a new genus of aquatic macroinvertebrate recently discovered at Arcola Mills and named after the site. Arcola Mills is identified as a state site of biodiversity significance for its high quality native plant communities and context within the landscape. Ravines are forested with oak, maple, and basswood. Seepage swamps and lowland hardwoods canopy the seeps, ravine bottoms and river floodplain that adjoins the Arcola Sandbar area of natural islands, backwater marshes, and meanders. Several listed species (e.g. cattail sedge, American ginseng, Louisiana waterthrush, and trumpeter swan) are documented at Arcola Mills. Also, a 2005 Audubon survey found several birds listed by the DNR as Species of Greatest Conservation Need (Eastern Wood-Pewee, Ovenbird, Prothonotary Warbler, Blue-winged Warbler, Golden-winged Warbler, and Canada Warbler). Bald eagles nest in the bluffs and islands of the Arcola area and a heron rookery was formed in the area since motorized traffic from the south was reduced several years ago.

Arcola Mills is also the site of a historic sawmill village. Two buildings on the site are National Historic Register listed, including the oldest, timber frame construction home in Minnesota. Public educational classes, tours, scientific and historical programs attract many visitors from the Twin Cities (St Paul is just 22 miles away) to witness firsthand the importance of forest conservation and natural history in this

unique setting. Acquisition of the conservation easement not only assures that none of the site's natural resources will be lost to development, but also the funds received by the Arcola Mills Historic Foundation through the sale are going directly to enhance resource interpretation and conservation at the site.

Simultaneous with this land protection project, Metro Conservation Corridors partners (Metro Greenways and Great River Greening) used \$9,000 LCMRapproved restoration funding (reported separately through Greening) to leverage \$15,000 of federal Upper Mississippi River Forestry Partnership funds and another \$9,000 in private, inkind, and Sentence-to-Service to develop a natural resource management plan, museum interpretive materials, and implement 40-acres of forest restoration including white pine reforestation in a oak wilt pocket that was treated, as well as woody exotics removal.

The Arcola Mills conservation easement acquisition project including using LCMR funding from this 2003 appropriation for real estate transaction costs including the survey and appraisal. The Phase I Environmental Assessment was completed using federal funds received through the Mn Pollution Control Agency.

The primary setback for this project was the inability to leverage federal funding. An Anoka County site within the Lower St. Croix Forest Legacy Area in 2003 (FFY2005 cycle) was Minnesota's 2<sup>nd</sup> priority site and included by the NE Area of the Forest Service in their list of recommended sites, but it was not recommended for funding at the national level. The Arcola Mills site was nominated, but faced tough competition in Minnesota in 2004 Forest Legacy applications. Arcola Mills was initially ranked 3<sup>rd</sup> in the state in the Minnesota State Forest Stewardship Committee's rating and it was initially submitted to the USDA Forest Service for funding. But, when the previous year's federal priority for Forest Legacy in Minnesota was only partially funded, it (a large Potlatch parcel) bumped Arcola off the current federal-funding list, since the state may only submit 3 projects.

# VI. PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE SPENDING:

## A. Past Spending:

The Lower St. Croix Forest Legacy Area had not been activated until 2003 and had not been eligible to receive federal funding. No state funding has been directly spent on Forest Legacy in Metro (although Metro Greenways funding has been spent on conservation easements on forested tracts within the Lower St. Croix Forest Legacy Area). In FY00-03, Minnesota received nearly \$2 million in U.S.D.A. funds for Forest Legacy areas in other parts of the state and leveraged a comparable amount in local and state funds.

## **B. Current Spending:**

DNR budget has committed general funds for 1 FTE to state Forest Legacy staff, plus approximately .1 FTE in Central Region.

## C. Required Match (if applicable): NA

**D. Future Spending:** The DNR expects to continue to seek state and federal funds for Forest Legacy conservation easement or fee title acquisition of forest lands, but none are expected to be within the Metropolitan Area.

## **VII. Project Partners:**

**A. Partners Receiving LCMR Funds**: DNR Forestry/Forest Legacy partnered with Metro Greenways on this acquisition. Great River Greening simultaneously did a restoration project at this site (reported separately) that utilized federal, private and LCMR-approved funding.

**B. Project Cooperators**: Forest Legacy in the Lower St. Croix was achieved through cooperation between the DNR Divisions of Forestry and Regional Operations/Metro Greenways, and the U.S.D.A. Forest Service. This project included involvement of the Washington County, Great River Greening, Minnesota Land Trust, and National Park Service.

VIII. DISSEMINATION: Information on Forest Legacy is posted on the DNR website <u>www.dnr.state.mn.us</u>. Great River Greening and DNR newsletters referenced their Arcola Mills projects. The media was provided information on the project including use of the Environment and Natural Resources Trust fund.

**IX.** LOCATION: The Lower St. Croix Forest Legacy Area includes selected areas of northeastern Anoka County (East Bethel, Linwood, and Columbus) and northern and eastern Washington Co (Forest Lake, New Scandia, Marine-on-St. Croix, Hugo, May, Grant, Stillwater Twsp, Baytown, West Lakeland, Afton, and Denmark). This project was targeted only at one location within Focus Area 4. St. Croix River.

**X. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS:** Periodic work program progress reports were submitted ~ February 1 in 2004, 2005, and 2006, and August 1 in 2004 and 2005.
