Overall Project Outcome and Results

The objective was to provide state matching grants to assist local governments in: 1) acquisition of natural and scenic areas; 2) acquisition and development of regional parks outside the Metro Area; and 3) acquisition and development of local parks and to provide funding for administration of the program.

Acquisition and Development:

A total of 22 projects were completed (see work program for more details):

- \$849,163 for six Natural and Scenic Area acquisitions totaling 142.35 acres
- \$284,851 for four Outdoor Recreation (local park) acquisition and development projects. A total of 77.5 acres was acquired.
- \$1,407,478 for twelve Regional Park Grant acquisition and development projects. A total of 478.35 acres was acquired.
- A total of thirteen acquisition projects totaling 698.2 acres and \$1,760,283
- A total of twelve development/restoration projects (three projects involved both acquisition and development) for \$781,209
- Protected natural habitat including river bluffs and cliffs, wetlands, maple/basswood forest, oak woodland, prairie, lake shore, remnant white pines, rare Tubercled Rein Orchids, and scenic bluff lands.
- Developed over two miles of trails, campground improvements, picnic shelters, fishing pier, boat launch, beach building, accessible restroom/shower buildings and other support facilities and restored almost 200 acres of prairie.

Administration and Planning:

Completed several annual grant solicitations, project evaluations and rankings; prepared 22 grant agreements; processed numerous project billings; completed numerous on site progress inspections and final project inspections; completed work program updates and final report; and performed other administrative functions necessary to complete the projects.

Project Results and Dissemination

Information about the Regional Park areas has been posted on the DNR web site. Information about the Natural and Scenic Area sites will also be added to the web site. More detailed descriptions of the projects, a map showing location of the projects in the state and photos of some of the projects are included in the final work program report.

I. Appropriation and Statutory Language:

1998 General Revenue: M.L. 1998. Chap. 404, Sec. 7, Subd. 26. Local Initiative Grants. 8,000,000.

For matching grants to be provided to local units of government for acquisition, development, or renovation of a capital nature of local parks, trails, and natural and scenic areas. Recipients must provide a match of at least one-half of total eligible project costs. The commissioner shall make payment to local units of government upon receiving documentation of reimbursable expenditures. The commissioner shall determine project priorities as appropriate based upon need.

\$3,500,000 of this appropriation is for grants to local units of government to acquire and develop outdoor recreation areas, and for grants to units of government to acquire and better natural and scenic areas under Minnesota Statutes, section 85.019, subdivision 4a.

\$1,000,000 of this appropriation is for cooperative trail grants of up to \$50,000 per project to acquire or construct trail linkages between communities, trails, and parks.

\$3,500,000 of this appropriation is for trail grants for the following locally funded publicly owned trails serving multiple communities: \$1,400,000 for Beaver Island Trail in Stearns County, \$1,400,000 for Skunk Hollow Trail in Yellow Medicine and Chippewa Counties, and \$700,000 for Unity Trail in Faribault County. The grant for Beaver Island Trail in Stearns County is available in the manner and the order that follows: \$500,000 is available upon commitment of an equal amount from non state sources, \$152,000 is available upon contribution of an equal amount from local governments, \$374,000 is available upon commitment of an equal amount from non state sources, and the balance of \$374,000 is available upon commitment of an equal amount from non state sources.

1999 MFRF/ETF: M.L. 1999 Chap. 231, Section 16, Subd. 4(a) . Local Initiatives Grants Program. \$5,117,000.

This appropriation is to the commissioner of natural resources to provide matching grants, as follows: (1) \$1,953,000 is from the future resources fund to local units of government for local park and recreation areas of up to \$250,000 not withstanding Minnesota Statutes 85.019. \$50,000 is to complete the Larue Pit Recreation Development. \$28,000 is to the city of Hitterdal for park construction at Lake Flora. \$460,000 is available on the day following final enactment.

(2) \$435,000 the first year and \$435,000 the second year are from the trust fund to local units of government for natural and scenic areas pursuant to Minnesota Statutes, section 85.019.

(3) \$1,484,000 is from the future resources fund for trail grants to local units of government on land to be maintained for at least 20 years for the purposes of the grant. \$500,000 is for grants of up to \$50,000 per project for trail linkages between communities, trails, and parks, and \$720,000 is for grants of up to \$250,000 for locally funded trails of regional significance outside the metropolitan area. \$50,000 is to the upper Minnesota River Valley regional development commission for the preliminary design and engineering of a single segment of the Minnesota River trail from Appleton to the Milan Beach on Lake Lac Qui Parle. \$160,000 is to the Department of Natural Resources to resurface four miles of recreational trail from the town of Milan to Lake Lac Qui Parle in Chippewa County.

(4) \$305,000 the first year and \$305,000 the second year are from the trust fund for a statewide conservation partners program, to encourage private organizations and local governments to cost share improvement of fish, wildlife, and native plant habitats and research and surveys of fish and wildlife. Conservation partners grants may be up to \$20,000 each. \$10,000 of this appropriation is for an agreement with the Canby Sportsman's Club for shelterbelts for habitat and erosion control.

(5) \$100,000 the first year and \$100,000 the second year are from the trust fund for environmental partnerships program grants of up to \$20,000 each for environmental service projects and related education activities through public and private partnerships.

In addition to the required work program, grants may not be approved until grant proposals to be funded have been submitted to the legislative commission on Minnesota resources and the commission has approved the grants or allowed 60 days to pass. The commission shall monitor the grants for approximate balance over extended periods of time between the metropolitan area as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 473.121, subdivision 2 and the non-metropolitan area through work program oversight and periodic allocation decisions. For the purpose of this paragraph, the match must be nonstate contributions, but may be either cash or in-kind. Recipients may receive funding for more than one project in any given grant period. This appropriation is available until June 30, 2002 at which time the project must be completed and final products delivered, unless an earlier date is specified in the work program. I f a project financed under this program receives a federal grant, the availability of the financing from this subdivision for that project is extended to equal the period of the federal grant.

2000 Bonding: M.L. 2000, Chap. 492, Sec.7, Subd. 11. Regional Parks: Greater Minnesota

For grants to public regional parks organizations located outside the metropolitan area as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 473.121, subdivision 2, to acquire land design, and construct and redevelop regional parks and trails, open space, and recreational facilities. The improvements must be of a capital nature. Each \$3 of state grants must be matched by \$2 of non state funds.

2001 MFRF/ETF: M.L. 2001, Chap. 2, Sec. 14, Subd. 5(b).

(b) Local Grants Initiative Program: Outdoor Recreation Grants

\$1,614,000 the first year and \$1,7651,000 the second year are from the trust fund and \$1,701,000 is from the future resources fund to the commissioner of natural resources for matching grants:

(1) for regional parks outside the metropolitan area as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 473.121;

(2) for local parks, outdoor recreation areas, and natural and scenic areas under Minnesota Statutes, section 85.019;

(3) for statewide conservation partners grants of up to \$20,000 each to encourage private organizations and local governments to cost-share improvements of fish, wildlife, and native plant habitats and research and surveys of fish and wildlife; and

(4) for environmental partnerships program grants of up to \$20,000 each for environmental service projects and related education activities through public and private partnerships.

Grants under clause (1) may provide up to 60 percent of the non federal share of the projects cost. Grants under clauses (2) to (4) may provide up to 50 percent of the non federal share of the project **cost**. This appropriation includes money for the Ramsey-Washington Lake Links trail, Westwood Hills nature center, and the Chanhassen trail.

The commission will monitor the grants for an approximate balance over extended periods of time between the metropolitan area, under Minnesota Statutes, section 473.121, subdivision 2, and the non metropolitan area through work program oversight and periodic allocation decisions. For the purposes of this paragraph, the match must be a non state contribution, but may be either cash or qualifying in kind. Recipients may receive funding for more than one project in any given grant period. This appropriation is available until June 30, 2004, at which time the project must be completed and final products delivered.

6(c) Local Initiative Grants - Parks and Natural Areas

\$1,290,000 the first year and \$1,289,000 the second year are from the trust fund to the commissioner of natural resources for matching grants to local governments for acquisition and development of natural and scenic areas and local parks as provided in Minnesota Statutes, section 85.019, subdivisions 2 and 4a, and regional parks outside of the metropolitan area. Grants may provide up to 50 percent of the nonfederal share of the project cost, except non metropolitan regional park grants may provide up to 60 percent of the nonfederal share of the project cost. The commission will monitor the grants for approximate balance over extended periods of time between the metropolitan area, under Minnesota Statutes, section 473.121, subdivision 2, and the non metropolitan area through work program oversight and periodic allocation decisions. For the purposes of this paragraph, the match must be a nonstate contribution, but may be either cash or qualifying in-kind. Recipients may receive funding for more than one project in any given grant period. This appropriation is available until June 30, 2006, at which time the project must be completed and final products delivered.

M. L. 2006, Chapter 243

Sec. 16. CARRYFORWARD. The appropriation under Laws 2003, chapter 128, article 1, section 9, subdivision 6, paragraph (c), for local initiative grants – parks and natural areas, is available until June 30, 2007.

Statutory Language:

85.019 LOCAL RECREATION GRANTS.

Subdivision 1. **Definition.** For the purposes of this section, "unit of government" means a county, statutory or home rule charter city, or town.

Subd. 2. **Parks and outdoor recreation areas.** The commissioner shall administer a program to provide grants to local units of government for up to 50 percent of the costs of acquisition and betterment of public land and improvements needed for parks and other outdoor recreation areas and facilities.

Subd. 3. [Repealed by amendment, 1995 c 220 s 68]

Subd. 4. [Repealed by amendment, 1995 c 220 s 68]

Subd. 4a. **Natural and scenic areas.** The commissioner shall administer a program to provide grants to units of government and school districts for the acquisition and betterment of natural and scenic areas such as blufflands, prairies, shorelands, wtelands, and wooded areas. A grant may not exceed 50 percent or \$500,000, whichever is less, of the costs of acquisition and betterment of land acquired under this subdivision.

Subd. 4b. **Regional trails.** The commissioner shall administer a program to provide grants to units of government for acquisition and betterment of public land and improvements needed for trails outside the metropolitan area deemed to be of regional significance according to criteria published by the commissioner. Recipients must provide a nonstate cash match of at least one-half of total eligible project costs. If land used for the trail is not in full public ownership, then the recipients must

prove it is dedicated to the purposes of the grants for at least 20 years. The commissioner shall make payment to a unit of government upon receiving documentation of reimbursable expenditures. A unit of government may enter into a lease or management agreement for the trail, subject to section 16A.695.

Subd. 4c. Local trail connections. The commissioner shall administer a program to provide grants to units of government for up to 50 percent of the costs of acquisition and betterment of public land and improvements needed for trails that connect communities, trails, and parks and thereby increase the effective length of trail experiences. If land used for the trails is not in full public ownership, then the recipients must prove it is dedicated to the purposes of the grants for at least 20 years.

Subd. 5. **Powers; rules.** The commissioner has all the powers necessary and convenient to implement this section, including the authority to adopt rules for the program under chapter 14.

IV. OUTLINE OF PROJECT RESULTS: This project includes three separate matching grant programs designed to help local governments reserve open space and park land, protect natural areas and their associated natural communities and features, preserve scenic vistas and viewpoints, and develop or renovate outdoor recreation facilities.

Result 1: Natural and Scenic Area Grants

Description: A total of six projects are proposed for funding. The proposed total amount of grants is \$849,163. The estimated amount of acres to be acquired is 142.35 acres. (See attached list of projects and descriptions).

Summary Budget Information for Result 1: LCMR Budget \$849,163 Balance 0

Completion Date: A list of projects is attached. All six acquisitions were completed by June 30, 2007.

Result Status as of August, 2007: All acquisitions have been completed and the total land acquired was 142.35 acres. These projects helped protect shore land, high quality natural areas (including some rare and significant species and plant communities) and the culturally, historically and scenically significant Pilot Knob site. Prairie and oak savanna restoration is currently underway at Pilot Knob. More details are provided in the attached list of projects and descriptions.

Result 2: Regional Parks (Outside the Metro Area)

Description: A total of twelve projects are proposed for funding. The proposed total amount of grants is \$1,407,478. The estimated amount of acres to be acquired is 528.35 acres. This leaves an unencumbered balance of \$17,508. The \$17,508 was unspent from a grant made to the Hormel Nature Center. Restoration costs for that project were less than estimated. We will request that this balance be reallocated to another project, probably an acquisition project that we know will be completed before June 30, 2007. Proposed regional park acquisition or development to be completed is attached. **(See the attached list of projects and descriptions).**

Summary Budget Information for Result 2: LCMR Budget \$1,424,986 Balance \$17,508

Completion Date: A list of projects is attached. All twelve projects were completed by June 30, 2007.

Result Status as of August, 2007: All acquisitions have been completed and the total land acquired was 488.35 acres. The Olmsted County Fritz Property acquisition was somewhat less than the original estimated acreage. Development and redevelopment of park facilities and habitat restoration was also completed for several projects. The three most significant acquisitions were an addition to the existing Hormel Nature Center prairie area at Austin, acquisition of new regional park land in Olmsted County along the North Branch of the Root River and acquisition of a new regional park in Mankato located on the Minnesota River. More details are provided in the attached list of projects and descriptions.

Result 3: Local Park Grants

Description: A total of four projects are proposed for funding. The proposed total amount of grants is \$284,851. The estimated amount of acres to be acquired is 77.5. Proposed outdoor recreation development to be completed is attached. (See the attached list of projects and descriptions).

Completion Date: A list of projects is attached. All four projects were completed by June 30, 2007.

Result Status as of August, 2007: All four projects have been completed and the total land acquired was 77.5 acres. Development and redevelopment of park facilities was also completed. The land acquisition was for a new county park in Isanti County that includes about 3,000 feet of frontage on Lake Seventeen. The Anoka County Twin Lakes Park has been transferred to Burns Township. More details are provided in the attached list of projects and descriptions.

Result 4: Administrative Costs

Description: \$20,000 is requested to support personnel costs for administering the grant programs. Grants staff are involved in grant solicitation, evaluation and ranking, grant agreement management, project billings, project inspections, and compliance monitoring.

Completion Date: All administrative costs were incurred well before June 30, 2006.

Result Status as of August, 2007: Sufficient administrative costs were cost coded during the first year of the project.

VI. PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE SPENDING:

A. Past Spending: During the past biennium a total of \$3,105,000 in grants was provided for projects through the three grant programs. A total of \$1,155,000 was spent for Local Park Grants, \$1,250,000 for Natural and Scenic Area grants and \$700,000 for Regional Park Grants.

B. Current Spending:

c. Required Match: For the Local Park Grant and Natural and Scenic Area Grant programs, local governments will match the state grants on a 50/50 basis, resulting in a local match of at least \$1,134,014. For the Regional Park Grant program local governments provide a match of \$2 for every \$3 of state funds, resulting in a local match of at least \$938,319. For many projects the actual match exceeded the minimum match requirement. The total minimum match provided was \$2,072,333.

D. Future Spending: The 2005 legislature appropriated \$1,200,000 for non-metro regional park and statewide natural and scenic area acquisition only. The 2006 legislature appropriated \$2,000,000 for acquisition and betterment of non-metro regional parks and local parks and natural and scenic areas statewide. The 2007 legislature appropriated \$1,000,000 for non-metro regional park and statewide natural and scenic area acquisition only.

VII. PROJECT PARTNERS:

A. Partners Receiving LCMR Funds: Local governments will receive \$2,541,492 in grants and contribute at least \$2,072,333 in match, which may include in-kind, and will be responsible for ongoing operations and maintenance costs.

VIII. DISSEMINATION: Each year the Local Grants Unit of DNR distributes information on the various grant programs and application materials to local governments and private organizations throughout the state. A general mailing is made at the beginning of each application period, usually in the fall, and individual requests are handled on a case by case basis. Grant information is also distributed to and is available from the

DNR Regional offices. The DNR web site includes a "Financial Assistance Directory", which provides information on the Local Initiative Grant programs, as well as many other sources of financial assistance within the DNR for natural resource projects. The information is on the DNR web site at dnr.state.mn.us. Click "Grants" to find the various grant categories.

IX. LOCATION: The grant program is a statewide grant program, except for the Regional Park Grants, which are available to eligible recipients outside the Metro Area. Projects will be located at various locations throughout the state (See the attached map and lists of projects and descriptions).

X. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS: periodic work program progress reports will be submitted not later than December 2003, June 2004, December 2004, June 2005, December 2005, June, 2006, and December, 2006. A final work program report and associated products will be submitted by August, 2007.
