Appropriation Language: \$87,000 the first year and \$88,000 the second year are from the trust fund to the Minnesota Historical Society to purchase land adjacent to the Lower Sioux Agency, Jeffers Petroglyphs, and Oliver Kelley Farm sites to protect the historic resources. Allocation of dollars between the three sites shall be determined based on the willingness of sellers and reasonable purchase prices at the respective sites. This appropriation is available until June 30, 2002, at which time the project must be completed and final products delivered, unless an earlier date is specified in the work program.

IV. OUTLINE OF PROJECT RESULTS:

Result 1: Purchase of land at Jeffers Petroglyphs, Lower Sioux Agency, or the Oliver Kelley Farm. Specific acres at each site will be based the willingness of sellers and reasonable purchase prices. Given the amount of funds available, it is unlikely that we will able to purchase land at all three sites.

The relatively large remaining balance in for this project is due to the particular combination of willing sellers and available purchase prices. Early in the project, we abandoned the possibility of purchasing the Lower Sioux Agency property because the landowner decided that this was not the right time to sell. At the Kelley Farm, we knew that purchase of land was not likely for amount available in the project funding. However, we made some good headway towards solidifying a relationship and possible future deal with the adjacent landowner, without any cost to the project. At Jeffers Petroglyphs, one of three possible landowners was a willing seller, but the fair purchase price did not use the entire amount of project funds.

The significance of the land that was acquired is substantial. It will serve three purposes—to protect the southern edge of the site from possible development or quarrying activity, to allow a restoration of prairie plants, and to allow expanded program or ceremonial uses of the site.

VI. CONTEXT:

A. Significance:

Jeffers Petroglyphs

This state historic site contains some of the oldest evidence of human habitation in the state. The site is also a prime location for virgin and restored native prairie grass (some of the restored prairie is funded through LCMR) as well as endangered plant species. In particular, during site preparation for the new visitor center, a large concentration of Prairie Bush Clover was discovered on the southwest corner of the site. DNR officials believe that it is one of the largest concentrations of this species in the country. The addition of land to the south of the site will provide further protection and expansion space for this plant species.

The recently finished visitor center and the exhibit program that is under construction will encourage visitors to appreciate both its 5,000 years of human development and also its tremendous natural beauty. The land under consideration to the west and south of the current site is threatened by possible expansion of a nearby rock quarry, and by current cattle grazing on the land. This addition of land will also expand those opportunities, and increase the scope of environmental and historical preservation in this part of the state.

Lower Sioux Agency

The ability to protect the site of the Redwood Ferry crossing on both sides of the river would greatly enhance the story that this site tells. This state historic site is well known as the location of one of the first major engagements in the U.S.-Dakota Conflict of 1862, but we are just now starting to make people understand why it happened at this particular place. Historically, the site was located here because of its strategic place on the Minnesota River. The river was the highway to St. Paul, and the ferry crossing allowed people from each side of the river to interact with each other. On August 18, 1862, the ferry crossing first served as the means for people to cross the river to get on the road to Fort Ridgely, and later in the day it was the site of an engagement between Dakota and United States forces. There are stone markers in this area, dating from the turn of the century. The new Heritage Trails take visitors down the bluff to this critical part of the site.

Kelley Farm

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The Oliver Kelley Farm is both a state historic site and a National Historic Landmark. It holds historic importance as the birthplace of the Grange Movement, and today it helps people remain connected to their agricultural heritage. In recent years, commercial and residential development has proceeded at an astounding pace along the Highway 10 corridor. As this development continues, the Kelley Farm will increasingly become a green island in the middle of urban sprawl. By adding acres to the site, views of urban development will be shielded from the historic farmstead (as they now are on the east side of the property with current land ownership) and from newly built nature trails.

Significance--Budget Context

As indicated below, no dollars have yet been spent on this particular project. Nevertheless, significant LCMR and non-LCMR funds have recently been invested in these sites, and the land expansion will enhance those improvements. The LCMR Heritage Trails project spent \$99,301 for trails at these three sites, which was augmented by \$178,000 from capital bond and ISTEA funds; the Lower Sioux Agency trail runs directly past the Redwood Ferry Site, and the trails at the Kelley farm are adjacent to the land under consideration there. A current LCMR project totaling \$125,000 is being implemented to assess the environment and to restore some of the prairie at the Jeffers Petroglyphs. Finally, capital bond funds totaling \$851,000 were recently used to build a new visitor center at the Petroglyphs.

B. Time:

This project should be complete within the three-year time frame.
