Dear Friends,

I am pleased to release the fiscal year 1991 report from the Fergus Falls Regional Treatment Center. The data and information contained in this report defines service and utilization from July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991.

The year was marked by continued progress toward our goal to provide quality inpatient services to individuals in crisis and to return clients to the community at their highest possible level of functioning. As the "safety net" for the counties and other service providers in northwest and west central Minnesota, the FFRTC routinely admits individuals whose developmental disability, mental illness, or chemical dependency problems are the most difficult to treat. I salute our trained, professional and dedicated staff who, through their individual expertise and contributions to the interdisciplinary team process, provide excellent care for our challenging clients. We will continue to explore new roles and functions for our facility and staff to meet the changing needs of our clients and the service system in the region.

During FY1991 the FFRTC also continued to work with architects for improvements to the physical plant. A major project is completion of design development for a 100-bed replacement facility for the mental health program. When built, the new hospital will provide for enhanced client services, while allowing for more efficient operation. A second project, the remodeling of an existing building into a skilled nursing facility, has been suspended for the time being.

As we progress into the decade of the 90's, it is evident that the future will continue to bring both challenges and opportunities for all human service agencies. We look forward to working with you as partners in providing needed services to the residents of north-western Minnesota.



Admissions to Fergus Falls Regional Treatment Center by County of Residence, Disability Group and Status for Fiscal Year 1990-1991.



Mental Health Division (MHD)

William Klein, Program Director

This past year has been an exciting year for the Mental Health Division. We have worked on our objectives to provide effective mental health care of the highest quality to our clientele.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS - FISCAL YEAR 1990-1991

- Once again we have received accolades from the Health Care Finance Administration (HCFA) over our program.
- We have maintained accreditation with the Joint Commission of Health Care Organizations (JCAHO).

We have maintained our licensed status with the State of Minnesota Rule 36.

- We have maintained our staffing complement and remain staffed with sufficient professionals in all vital areas.
- We have increased the diversity of our educational programs for patients and have added new therapy groups as well as revitalized
- We are having success with the new anti-psychotic drug Clozaril and have been able to move several chronic patients into the community as a result.
- We have launched our organization into a new era of continuous quality improvement using modern management techniques.

The Mental Health Division of the Fergus Falls Regional Treatment Center serves a diverse clientele. It has the diversity and expertise to treat individuals who have an acute mental illness, individuals with multiple diagnoses and individuals with behavior management problems. The Division serves people within the State of Minnesota but primarily within the seventeen county district in the northwest corner of the State of Minnesota.

Over the last year, the daily average census of the patients on the Division saw its third consecutive year of increase. We have been receiving more and more patients with serious and persistent mental illness with additional problems of chemical dependency, which exacerbated the psychiatric symptoms and makes treatment more difficult. In addition, the number of voluntary patients has continued to decrease with a concomitant increase in emergency admissions.

The Mental Health Division believes in the uniqueness, the potential and the worth and dignity of each person served. It believes that the people receiving care and treatment will recover and return to the community with the opportunity to resume a productive life. The Mental Health Division is committed to seeking excellence in services and programs for clients and their families. Central to Mental Health Division programs is the concept of milieu therapy which holds that the daily life experiences of people served can be used therapeutically to teach and to promote individual responsibility and independence.

Drug Dependency Rehabilitation Center (DDRC)

Carol Hovland, Program Director

The Drug Dependency Rehabilitation Center offers a variety of care options for males and females, ages 12 and older, providing treatment programs most suited to individual needs. The program is based on the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous.

PROGRAMS

Primary: Short-term program for males and females who have had minimal prior treatment.

Extended: Intensive program for males and females who have had prior treatment,

and may have secondary mental illness problems.

Halt: Secure program for males and females who have a history of previous treatment elopements.

Adolescents: Integrated program for adolescents with primary problems of chemical dependency.

Outpatient: Structured program with four weekly sessions for four weeks and twelve weekly aftercare sessions.

Family: Live-in program for family members/significant others and chemical dependency professionals.

DWI Clinic: Two day live-in educational program for persons charged with DWI.

Shared Services

Program: DDRC has a Shared Services agreement with Clay County Social Services Dept. to provide one counselor and

administrative services for the Clay County Outpatient Program. Chemical dependency counseling services are

provided to Pelican Rapids High School one day a week and Barnesville High School four days a week.

All inpatient programs are provided on one floor, providing for a more effective and efficient utilization of staff resources.

The climate surrounding chemical dependency treatment requires an ongoing evaluation of the programs we provide, in an attempt to meet the ongoing demands and ever-changing needs. Our goal is to provide quality rehabilitation to restore dignity and respect to those we serve.

Discharges have slowed during the past year compared to previous years. This may be due to county and state budgetary restraints that prevent the development of alternative housing.

During the past year we opened North Country Options, our first off campus vocational program. The program is located in downtown Fergus Falls and has a retail outlet combined so products may be sold.

We have expanded our resident pay program so individuals with severe disabilites may become involved. Individuals are working on a paper shredder, assisting housekeeping, plant operations, and running Orchard Ridge Driving Range, which is located on campus.

During the coming year, we will continue to expand vocational opportunities, develop a crisis intervention team and expand our range of services through shared service agreements.

Medical Department

Leonard E. Woytassek, M.D., Medical Director

During the last year the Medical Department continued to undergo changes, some of which have been necessitated in order to meet HCFA and JCAHO requirements. In addition to the full-time Medical Director, who is also a Board Certified Psychiatrist, our Medical Staff presently consists of three full-time psychiatrists, four full-time Family Practitioners, two full-time Adult Nurse Practitioners, one part-time Adult Nurse Practitioner, one full-time Dentist, and an Office Assistant. We also utilize the services of one contract psychiatrist to assist during vacations, and continue to recruit for one more full-time psychiatrist. The Medical Department also includes supervision of the Chief Pharmacist, the laboratory technicians, the Dietitian, and the Office Assistant.

Our goal continues to be to provide good medical and psychiatric services to the patients of the Fergus Falls Regional Treatment Center.

The Medical Staff continues to meet on a regular basis, with the Executive Committee of the Medical Staff meeting monthly and reviewing reports from active hospital committees. The Quality Assurance and Credentialling processes, including a Peer Review System, continue active.

Our contractual relationships continue with the Fergus Falls Medical Group and with Lake Region Hospital to provide additional medical care necessary for our patients. We contract with Smithkline Beecham Laboratories in Minneapolis for all laboratory testing, with emergency tests being done at Lake Region Hospital.

FFRTC now has a registered Clozaril treatment system, which means that we can dispense Clozaril and do our own blood monitoring.

A recent HCFA survey of the Mental Health Division of FFRTC was held. There were no reported major deficiencies.

The Medical Staff has recently completed revising/updating the Medical Staff Bylaws and the Medical Staff Rules and Regulations to more accurately represent the actual organization of the Medical Staff. These will be submitted to the Governing Board for approval.

The Pharmacy recently purchased a computerized unit dose packaging machine that will improve the accuracy and safety of the unit dose medications.


