



Drug Dependency Rehabilitation Center ==

The Drug Dependency Rehabilitation Center offers a variety of care options for males and females, ages 12 and older, providing treatment programs most suited to individual needs. The program is based on the principles of Alcoholics Anonymous. Professional staff available to provide a full range of services include: CD Counselors; Nursing Staff; Medical Staff; Psychologist; Social Worker; Chaplain; and Recreation Therapist.

LEVELS OF CARE:

Primary: Short-term for persons who have had minimal prior treatment.

Extended: 45 - 60 day program for persons with extensive prior treatment, and may have secondary mental illness problems.

Halt: Locked program for persons with previous history of treatment elopements; may have secondary mental illness.

Outpatient: Structured program of three weekly sessions for four weeks with twelve weekly aftercare sessions.

Family: Live-in program for family members/significant others and chemical dependency professionals.

DWI Clinic: Two day live-in educational program for persons charged with DWI.

Shared Services Program: DDRC has a Shared Services agreement with Clay County Social Services Department to provide one counselor and administrative services for the Clay County Outpatient Program. Chemical dependency counseling services are provided to Pelican Rapids High School one day a week.

The average daily census has increased on DDRC over the past 4 years. As a result of this, and in response to community requests, the bed capacity of Halt Unit was increased. Additionally, the program was designed to accommodate two levels of care to improve client outcome. Staff were hired for this expansion.

To provide continuity of care in an emergency situation, DDRC provided a CD Counselor for Marshall and Kittson Counties to staff their out-patient program and to do Rule 25 assessments.

The strength of DDRC's programs is a strong partnership with the counties we serve, working together to provide a continuum of services to maximize the success for the clients served.

Mental Health Division

The Mental Health Division provides comprehensive psychiatric treatment services to persons affected by mental illness.

* The program has maintained:

Accreditation by Joint Commission on Accreditation of Health Care Organizations (JCAHO) Certification by Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) and Licensing by Minnesota Department of Human Services

- * The Mental Health Division has become a major teaching resource for the region, providing training and clinical experience for Community Providers, Chaplaincy students, Pharmacy students, Licensed Practical Nurse students, Registered Nurse students, Psychology students, Social Work students, Recreational Therapy students, Occupational Therapy students and many more.
- * Mental Health Division Services are designed to meet individualized needs identified through professional assessment by a Multidisciplinary Treatment Team. Mental Health Division services range from evaluation and crisis intervention to psychiatric rehabilitation and community re-entry services.
- * Multidisciplinary professional staff use a variety of treatment modalities to help Mental Health Division clients achieve optimum health and resume a productive life in the community.
- * The number of admissions has increased from 350 in FY93 to 430 in FY94.

The Developmental Disability Division provides residential, vocational and behavioral consultation services to individuals with developmental disabilities in Northwestern Minnesota. The program is accredited by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO).

Residential Services

The Division has begun it's transition from a campus based to community based operation. We are currently operating three community residential service sites and one vocational program. The residential services allow individuals a more natural environment with a higher staffing ratio. In addition the individuals living there have more opportunities for participation in household activities and community integration. We anticipate continued growth in providing these services as the population of the RTC continues to decline.

Vocational Services

Our vocational services program has maintained a variety of opportunities for the people we serve. We continue with the manufacturing of outdoor furniture and craft items, housekeeping and cleaning crews, and recycling. The Orchard Ridge Driving Range had a steady business as did our community based program, North Country Options. We are constantly looking to develop opportunities that enhance an individuals self worth and productivity.

Community Support Services


The Developmental Disability Division offers community support for providers of services to developmentally disabled individuals in the seventeen county catchment area. These services are designed to help maintain the community placements of clients in the least restrictive placement possible. This is done by using behavioral assessments, program consultation, and training to proactively intervene with challenging behaviors. Occasionally, speech/communication, sensory integration, physical therapy, pharmaceutical, nursing, and day habilitation consultation is furnished to assist in community program development. These services are accessed through county case managers, who determine what expertise they require to assist in maintaining the placement.



Average Daily Census Fiscal Year


