

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### CRIME TRENDS IN THE TWIN CITIES METROPOLITAN AREA 1970 to 1980

**April 1982** 

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#### SUMMARY

The Twin Cities Metropolitan Area experienced a sharp increase of reported "serious" crime in the 1970s.

Serious crimes are the seven FBI-designated Part I crimes of: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor-vehicle theft.

The rate, or number of crimes committed per 100,000 Area inhabitants, rose 31 percent over the decade. The rate of 6,317 crimes committed per 100,000 people includes a 9-percent increase from 1979 to 1980.

The volume of serious crime increased 39 percent over the decade, including a 9-percent increase from 1979 to 1980.

The Area's crime increase cannot be explained by population growth alone, because the Area's population grew only 5.9 percent over the decade.

Area crimes in 1980 represent 64 percent of serious crimes reported in Minnesota, although only 49 percent of the state's population lives in the Twin Cities Area.

Forcible rape was the fastest growing crime reported over the decade. It increased 138 percent. Over the same period, motor-vehicle thefts showed the greatest decline, falling 28 percent. In the 1979-80 period, burglary was the fastest growing crime, increasing 13 percent.

Property crimes (i.e., crimes against property that include burglary, larceny-theft and auto theft) increased 31 percent over the decade and 9 percent from 1979 to 1980. Violent crimes (i.e., crimes against a person that include murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault) made up only six percent of all serious crimes reported in 1980. Violent crimes increased 42 percent over the decade, but decreased 4 percent from 1979 to 1980.

Almost 9 out of every 10 reported serious crimes in the Area in 1980 were the property offenses of larceny-theft and burglary.

Hennepin and Ramsey Counties accounted for 78 percent of the Area's reported serious crimes in 1980, a 6-percent increase over 1979. Half of Minnesota's crimes in 1980 occurred in the two counties.

Rates for all serious crimes have risen faster in the five outlying counties of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Scott and Washington than in the inner counties of Hennepin and Ramsey. Yet violent crime rates in Hennepin and Ramsey Counties are still more than four times greater than rates from any of the five outlying counties. However, the outlying counties appear to be almost as vulnerable to property crime as do the two inner counties.

The clearance rate, or percentage of cases solved, for reported serious crimes dropped from 20 percent in 1979 to 17 percent in 1980. This compares with a 1980 statewide clearance rate of 33 percent. While Area clearance rates for each of the serious crimes dropped from 1979 to 1980, the largest drop was for aggravated assault. It fell from 62 percent in 1979 to 48 percent in 1980.

Of the 25 largest metropolitan areas in the nation, the Twin Cities Area ranked 19th in rate of reported serious crime in 1980.

#### ABOUT THIS REPORT

This report provides a summary and analysis of 1970-80 crime statistics reported to law enforcement agencies in the Seven-County Metropolitan Area. The report examines problems of Part I, or "serious" crimes, from a regional perspective and shows the distribution of criminal offenses by county and community. The seven serious (Part I) crimes are: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor-vehicle theft. It also compares Metropolitan Area crime rates with those of the state and other large metropolitan areas in the nation.

The purpose of the report is to provide information to state and local government officials, law enforcement administrators, criminal justice professionals, educators and citizens of the Metropolitan Area. The information will assist them in developing policies and programs that respond to local crime problems.

The report has three major sections. The first describes the Area's incidences and rate of serious crime for 1980 and shows 10-year crime trends from 1970 to 1980. The section compares 1979 and 1980 clearance rates (i.e., percentages of cases solved), contrasts the Area's urban and rural crime rates, and compares Twin Cities Area crime rates to those nationwide.

The second section examines each of the seven serious crimes individually for the Metropolitan Area and for each county. Included for each crime category are the number of reported crimes, clearance rate, the rate of crime per 100,000 people and trends for that crime category. The report concludes with an examination of future crime trends and possible directions for crime prevention and control in the Twin Cities Area. Notes on where crime data comes from and how to interpret it is provided in Appendix A. Appendix B shows the numbers of each serious crime committed in 1980 for the Area's reporting cities.

### 1. REPORTED SERIOUS CRIME OFFENSES, METROPOLITAN AREA, 1970-1980

#### NUMBER OF REPORTED SERIOUS CRIMES

A reported 125,464 "Part I" or "serious" crime offenses occurred in the Seven-County Metropolitan Area in 1980, a nine-percent increase over crimes reported to law enforcement agencies in 1979. The seven serious crimes are: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor-vehicle theft. The 1980 total represents 64 percent of the serious crime offenses reported in Minnesota that year, although only 49 percent of the state's population lives in the seven Metropolitan Area counties.

The proportion of crimes in the state that occurred in the Metropolitan Area declined an average of one percent per year since 1972. Almost 9 out of every 10 of the Metropolitan Area crimes were the property offenses of larceny-theft and burglary. Property offenses are serious crimes against property that include burglary, larceny and motor-vehicle theft. Nearly 53 percent of these serious crimes were reported in Hennepin County (see Figures 1 and 2).1

Hennepin and Ramsey Counties accounted for 50 percent of reported serious crime offenses statewide in both 1979 and 1980. The two counties had 78 percent of reported crimes in the Metropolitan Area in 1980, up from 71.8 percent in 1979.

#### RATE OF REPORTED SERIOUS CRIMES

The number and rate of serious crimes reported in the Metropolitan Area increased significantly in the decade between 1970 and 1980. In all likelihood this trend will continue.

The reported serious crime rate in 1980 was 6,317 offenses per 100,000 population, an increase of 9.1 percent from 1979 and 31.4 percent from 1970. Figure 3 and Table 1 contrast the crime rate per 100,000 population for each of the Area's seven counties for 1970, 1979 and 1980.


#### TRENDS IN REPORTED SERIOUS CRIMES

The four violent crimes (murder, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault) comprised only six percent of the serious crimes reported in 1980 in the Metropolitan Area. The proportion decreased .4 percent from 1979. Property crimes (burglary, larceny-theft and motor-vehicle theft) increased 9.4 percent between 1979 and 1980.

Increases and decreases in the seven major crimes from 1979 to 1980 are listed in Table 2.

TWIN CITIES METROPOLITAN AREA, 1980





The Area has experienced a sharp increase in reported crime over the past decade. Long-term trends tend to be the most meaningful ones in the comparison and analysis of crime data (see Appendix A). Since 1970, the volume of serious crime offenses increased 39.4 percent. During this 10-year period, increases of 41.2 percent were reported in violent crime, and 31.3 percent was reported for property crime. Figures 4 and 5 show reported offense totals for the decade. Table 3 shows the number of serious crimes reported for each crime for each year of the decade.

Except for motor-vehicle theft, serious crime rates per 100,000 population over the decade have increased. The greatest increases in rates between 1979-80 occurred in the property crimes of larceny-theft and burglary (see Figures 6 and 7).

Crime increase over the decade cannot be explained in terms of population growth alone. Table 4 indicates population in the Metropolitan Area grew 5.9 percent from 1970 to 1980, while reported serious offenses increased 39.4 percent during the same period. Some of the increase may be the result of improved reporting procedures by police agencies throughout the Region. In addition, growing concern about the problem may have motivated more people to report suspected crimes to the police. See Appendix A for more information on factors that affect the reporting of crime.

While the rate of serious crimes has increased in the Metropolitan Area from 1970 to 1980, Figure 8 indicates the increase has been gradual. The figure shows that the crime rate increased steadily over the first five years of the decade, decreased from 1976 to 1978 and increased again over the last three years. Figure 8 shows these rate changes over the decade for reported violent crime, property crime and the two combined.





TWIN CITIES AREA, 1970-1980\*





IN THE TWIN CITIES AREA, 1970-1980







#### CLEARANCES OF REPORTED SERIOUS CRIMES

The clearance rate<sup>2</sup> for reported serious offenses was 17 percent in 1980, as compared with 20 percent in 1979. While the clearance rate decreased for each of the major offenses, the drop was most significant for aggravated assault. It fell from 62 percent in 1979 to 48 percent in 1980. Robbery clearance decreased from 24 percent in 1979 to 16 percent in 1980; rape dropped from 41 percent in 1979 to 30 percent in 1980; and burglary went from 11 percent in 1979 to 9 percent in 1980. Statewide, the 1980 clearance rate was 33 percent for all serious offenses.

#### URBAN-RURAL CONTRASTS IN REPORTED SERIOUS CRIMES

During the past decade, the most urbanized areas of Hennepin and Ramsey Counties have generally experienced a low rate of increase of serious crime compared with the growing suburbs in the five outlying counties of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Scott and Washington. Table 4 indicates that the increase in serious crime rates from 1970 to 1980 is less severe for those counties that had high base rates in 1970.

Table 5 illustrates that the difference in crime rate between urban and rural areas is narrowing, although it remains substantial. The 1980 violent crime rate<sup>3</sup> in Hennepin or Ramsey Counties is more than four times greater than that of any outlying counties of Anoka, Carver, Dakota, Scott or Washington. However, the less densely populated counties appear to be almost as vulnerable to property crime<sup>4</sup> as their urban neighbors. Hennepin and Ramsey Counties each have a property crime rate at least 20 percent higher than any of the five outlying counties.

For planning purposes, the Metropolitan Council has divided the Seven-County Area into three development areas: urban service area, rural service area and freestanding growth centers. An examination of crime rates by development area shows that crime rates in the rural service area<sup>5</sup> are about one-third of those in the urban service area. The freestanding growth centers rank in the middle: they have a higher crime rate than the rural service area, but measure about two-thirds of urban service area rates. Figure 9 locates these areas and Figures 10 and 11 present crime rates for these Metropolitan Council "policy areas."

#### CRIME COMPARISON, METROPOLITAN AREA AND THE NATION

Of the nation's 25 largest metropolitan areas, the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area ranked 19th in the rate of reported serious crime in 1980. The Metropolitan Area ranked low, 23rd, in its rate of violent crimes and 17th in its property crime rate. Figure 12 and Table 6 show the comparative crime statistics for 1980.

More than 24 million households, or almost a third of the nation's households, were victimized by crime in 1980, according to the *Bureau of Justice Statistics Bulletin*.<sup>8</sup> The proportion of households victimized by crime has changed little in each of the last six years (see Table 7).







DEVELOPMENT FRAMEWORK POLICY AREAS





#### 2. ANALYSIS OF EACH SERIOUS CRIME

#### MURDER AND NON-NEGLIGENT MANSLAUGHTER

#### Definition

Murder and non-negligent manslaughter, as defined in the Uniform Crime Reporting Program (UCR), is the willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another.

Classification of this offense, as in all other crime index offenses, is based solely on police investigation and voluntary submission of police statistics by law enforcement agencies. Classification is not determined by a court, medical examiner, coroner, jury, or other judicial body. Exempt from inclusion in this classification are: deaths caused by negligence, suicide or accident; justifiable homicides, which are the killings of felons by law enforcement officers in the line of duty or by private citizens; and attempts to murder or assaults to murder, which are defined as aggravated assaults.

#### **Number Reported**

Seventy murders were reported in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area during 1980, which is 67 percent of all murders statewide. Hennepin County accounted for 64 percent of murders in the Seven-County Area and 43 percent of murders statewide (see Table 8).

#### Clearance Rate

The Metropolitan Area clearance rate (percentage of cases solved) for murder during 1980 was 76 percent, only 2 percent less than the rate for 1979.

#### Rate

In 1980 there were 3.5 murders for every 100,000 Twin Cities Area inhabitants, which compares with a 3.4 murder rate in 1979. The 1980 statewide murder rate was 3.0 per 100,000 population.

#### Trend

The number of murders increased 2.9 percent from 1979 to 1980 in the Metropolitan Area. Table 2 shows an increase of 52 percent in murders reported from 1970 to 1980 in the Seven-County Area and an increase of 40 percent in the rate of murder during this same period.

Table 9 shows an increase of murders from 1979 to 1980 in Hennepin and Ramsey Counties, but no increase in surrounding counties.

### FORCIBLE RAPE

### Definition

Forcible rape, as defined by the UCR, constitutes sexual intercourse (sexual penetration, however slight) with a female (not one's wife) through the use of force or the threat of force

and against her will. The element of forcefully overcoming the victim's ability to resist can take the forms of physical power or coercive threats. If the victim is unconscious, or for some other reason (such as mental illness) unable to offer consent and this condition is known to the offender, the offense is still forcible rape.

The term "forcible" rape contrasts it with "statutory rape," in which sexual union is consensual but the female is under the legal age of consent. The UCR does not include statutory rape in reporting offenses, but does include assaults or attempts to commit rape by force or threat of force.

#### Number Reported

During 1980 there were 730 forcible rapes reported in the Metropolitan Area. Forcible rape made up .6 percent of the reported serious crime total and accounted for 9.6 percent of violent crimes. The seven serious crimes are: violent crimes are murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery and aggravated assault; property crimes are burglary, larceny-theft and motor-vehicle theft. In 1980, Hennepin County reported 50 percent of the rapes in Minnesota and 65 percent of rapes within the Metropolitan Area. Table 10 shows the Area's reported forcible rapes by county.

### Clearance Rate

The clearance rate for forcible rape in 1980 was 30 percent. This represents a drop in clearance rate for rape from the 1979 level of 41 percent.

#### Rate

By UCR definition, the victims of forcible rape are always female. Since a current estimate of the female population in the Metropolitan Area is not available, the rate per 100,000 has been calculated on total population. Accordingly, the 1980 rate for forcible rapes is 36.7 per 100,000, an increase from a rate of 32.9 in 1979.

#### Trend

The number of forcible rape offenses in 1980 was up 11.2 percent over 1979 and 138 percent over 1970. The increase in the rate of rapes (per 100,000 population) from 1970 to 1980 was 125 percent (see Table 3). Table 11 shows that the rate of reported forcible rapes rose in five of the seven Area counties from 1979 to 1980.

#### ROBBERY

#### Definition

Robbery is the taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons (owner or temporary guardian of the property) by force, threat of force or violence, or by putting the victim in fear. If a weapon is used to physically subdue or threaten the victim, the crime is "aggravated" or "armed" robbery. Pretended or unseen weapons constitute armed robbery or attempt, unless on-the-spot-arrest proves otherwise. Robbery of banks and commercial establishments are included in the UCR classification.

#### Number Reported

In 1980 there were 3,706 robberies reported in the Metropolitan Area. Robbery made up 49 percent of all violent crimes and 2.9 percent of all serious offenses. Of the Area's robberies, 68.7 percent occurred in Hennepin County. Robberies in the Metropolitan Area made up 92 percent of the state's robberies in 1980. More than two-thirds of the total Metropolitan Area robberies occurred in Hennepin, the state's most populous county. Table 12 shows the distribution of reported robberies throughout the Area's seven counties.

#### Clearance Rate

Sixteen percent of robberies reported in the Metropolitan Area during 1980 were cleared by arrest. This is a decrease from the 24-percent clearance rate in 1979.

#### Rate

The 1980 rate of 186.5 robberies per 100,000 inhabitants in the Metropolitan Area (Table 3) was 6.2 percent above the 1979 rate. The robbery rate statewide was 99 per 100,000 in 1980.

#### Trend

The number of robberies reported in 1980 increased 5.9 percent over 1979 and 12.9 percent over 1970. The overall Metropolitan Area rate for robbery increased 6.8 percent over the decade (see Table 3). Table 13 shows robbery rates among the Area's seven counties from 1979 to 1980.

#### AGGRAVATED ASSAULT

#### Definition

Aggravated assault is an unlawful attack by one person upon another for the purpose of inflicting severe bodily injury, usually accompanied by use of a weapon or other means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

It is not necessary that any injury result from an aggravated assault when a gun, knife, or other weapon is used that could result in serious personal injury. Factors in determining this offense are: type of weapon or use made of an object as a weapon; seriousness of injury; and intent of the assailant to inflict serious injury.

#### **Number Reported**

Aggravated assaults reported in the Metropolitan Area in 1980 numbered 3,036, making up 2.4 percent of all serious offenses and 40 percent of violent crimes. Eighty-nine percent of the Area's aggravated assaults were reported in Hennepin and Ramsey Counties (see Table 14). Hennepin County accounted for 39.1 percent of aggravated assaults statewide.

#### Clearance Rate

Forty-eight percent of aggravated assaults reported in the Metropolitan Area in 1980 were cleared by arrest, as compared with 62 percent in 1979.

#### Rate

During 1980, 153 aggravated assaults were reported per 100,000 inhabitants of the Seven-County Area. This was less than in 1979 when the aggravated assault rate reached a 10-year peak of 161 per 100,000 inhabitants (see Table 3). Ramsey County showed the highest rate of reported aggravated assaults in 1980 among the seven counties (see Table 15). The 1980 statewide rate of aggravated assaults was 103 per 100,000 inhabitants.

#### Trend

In 1980 the number of aggravated assaults decreased 5.1 percent compared with those in 1979 and increased 77 percent over the 1970 total. The rate of increase per 100,000 from 1970 to 1980 was 68 percent (see Table 3).

## **BURGLARY**

## Definition

Burglary is the unlawful entry of a structure to commit a theft or felony. The use of force to gain entry is not required to classify the offense as burglary. The Uniform Crime Report classifies burglary into three sub-groups: forcible entry, unlawful entry where no force is used, and attempted forcible entry.

#### **Number Reported**

In 1980 there were 33,640 burglaries reported in the Metropolitan Area, which was two-thirds of reported burglaries statewide. Hennepin and Ramsey Counties accounted for 81 percent of the Area's reported burglaries (see Table 16). Burglaries made up 26.8 percent of the Area's total reported serious offenses in 1980 and constituted 28.5 percent of property crimes.

#### Clearance Rate

Nine percent of burglaries reported in the Metropolitan Area in 1980 were cleared by arrest; down two percent from 1979.

#### Rate

The 1,694 burglaries per 100,000 inhabitants reported during 1980 rose 13.6 percent over the 1979 rate. The rate of burglaries (per 100,000 population) increased 42.2 percent from 1970 to 1980 (Table 3). Statewide the 1980 burglary rate was 1,245 victims per 100,000.

#### Trend

The number of burglary offenses rose 13.2 percent in 1980 over the number in 1979 and 51 percent over the 1970 figure (see Table 3). The number of reported burglaries and the rate of burglary increased in each of the seven Metropolitan Area counties from 1979 to 1980 (see Table 17).

#### LARCENY-THEFT

#### Definition

Larceny-theft is the unlawful taking, carrying, leading, or riding away of property from the

possession or constructive possession of another. Larceny and theft mean the same thing in Uniform Crime Reporting. Larceny-theft excludes motor-vehicle theft, which is counted separately because of the great number of thefts in that category.

All thefts that are not part of a robbery, burglary, or motor-vehicle theft are classified as larceny-theft regardless of the value of the article stolen. All thefts and attempted thefts are counted. It includes crimes such as shoplifting, pocket-picking, purse-snatching, thefts from motor vehicles, thefts of motor-vehicle parts and accessories, bicycle thefts, thefts from buildings, and thefts from coin-operated devices or machines in which no use of force, violence, or fraud occurs. This category does not include embezzlement, forgery or fraud.

#### **Number Reported**

In 1980, a total of 76,165 larceny-theft offenses were reported in the Metropolitan Area. Larceny-theft made up 60 percent of the Area's serious reported crimes and 64.5 percent of its property crimes. Hennepin County accounted for 51.4 percent of larceny-thefts reported in the Metropolitan Area (see Table 18). Statewide there were 122,728 larceny-thefts in 1980, of which Hennepin County made up 32 percent and Ramsey County 14.8 percent.

#### Clearance Rate

Nineteen percent of larceny-theft offenses reported in the Metropolitan Area were cleared by arrest. This represents a two-percent decrease from the 1979 clearance rate.

#### Rate

During 1980, there were 3,835 larceny-thefts in the Metropolitan Area per 100,000 inhabitants, an increase of 11 percent from the 1979 rate (see Table 3). Hennepin County led the Area in rate of larceny-thefts. Statewide the larceny-theft rate was 3,025 per 100,000 persons.

#### Trend

The number of larceny-thefts in 1980 rose 10.7 percent from 1979 in the Metropolitan Area and increased 49 percent from 1970. The rate (per 100,000 population) increased 41 percent from 1970 to 1980. With the exception of Dakota County, each of the Metropolitan Area counties reported an increase in the larceny-theft rate from 1979 to 1980 (see Table 19).

#### MOTOR-VEHICLE THEFT

#### Definition

Motor-vehicle theft is defined in UCR as the theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle. The UCR defines a motor vehicle as a self-propelled vehicle that runs on the surface and not on rails. Examples of motor vehicles include automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles, motor scooters and snowmobiles. Temporary use by those having lawful access is not counted as motor-vehicle theft.

#### **Number Reported**

There were 8,117 motor-vehicle thefts reported in the Metropolitan Area in 1980. This was 6.4 percent of all Metropolitan Area serious crimes. Hennepin County made up 56.7 percent of motor-vehicle thefts in the Seven-County Area (see Table 20). Statewide there were 12,008 motor-vehicle thefts reported in 1980, of which 55 percent occurred in Hennepin and Ramsey Counties.

#### Clearance Rate

The 1980 clearance rate for motor-vehicle theft was 18 percent, down 1 percent from 1979.

#### Rate

The motor-vehicle theft rate of 408.6 offenses per 100,000 inhabitants in 1980 dropped 12 percent from 1979 (Table 3). Hennepin and Ramsey Counties led the Area in rate of motor-vehicle thefts in 1980, although their rates fell from those of 1979 (see Table 21).

#### Trend

Over the decade, the number of motor-vehicle thefts in the Metropolitan Area decreased 28 percent. The rate of thefts per 100,000 fell from 601.5 in 1970 to 408.6 in 1980, a drop of 32 percent for the 10-year period (see Table 3). Of the seven Metropolitan Area counties, Ramsey County experienced the greatest reduction in motor-vehicle theft rate from 1979 to 1980 (Table 21).

#### 3. WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

With the preceding analysis of past crime trends as background, this section examines possible future directions for crime prevention and control in the Twin Cities Metropolitan Area.

#### HOW MUCH MORE CRIME IN THE FUTURE?

Unlike some other large metropolitan areas in the country, the Twin Cities Area has had only modest population growth from 1980 to 1981. This modest growth rate is expected to continue throughout the decade. If crime rates (that is, the number of crimes reported per 100,000 people) were to remain stable, the Area could expect a levelling off of the number of serious crimes reported in 1981 and in the rest of the decade. At worst, the Area could expect a modest increase of less than one percent from 1980 to 1981 and a relatively modest increase of approximately 11 percent for the decade.

However, the trend data in this report reveals a tendency toward increasing crime rates, particularly for the property crimes of burglary, robbery and larceny-theft. This crime rate increase may be fueled by the following unfavorable circumstances that have surfaced in 1981 and that may continue through the mid-1980s.

- Relatively high unemployment. Unemployment brings economic and emotional stress to individuals and families. This is a concern to the extent that such stresses are associated with crime.
- Unfulfilled economic aspirations of those who are employed. Rising inflation, energy costs and taxes erode family incomes, preventing employed people from achieving a standard of living many feel they deserve. This restriction may lead greater numbers of people to feel "cheated," which may erode their sense of responsibility to the community.
- A decline in availability of supportive services to families and children. This means fewer
  programs in employment training and diversion for young people who have shown a
  tendency to get into trouble.
- Overburdening of the criminal justice system. Declining tax revenue means less support for law enforcement, prosecution, court operations and corrections. Consequently, more people may be left free to commit crimes while awaiting investigation, apprehension, adjudication, sentencing and confinement.

On the other hand, other demographic changes projected for the Metropolitan Area point to a potential slowdown in the rising rate of crime. A steady decrease in crime-prone age groups (years 8 to 17) is projected over the next 10 years. If such an age shift occurs as predicted, it may offset the unfavorable circumstances listed above.

Studies have shown that a disproportionately large number of young people are arrested for serious crimes like burglary, larceny and auto theft. Some experts believe that these demographic factors (such as the percent of population under age 18) are a reliable predictor of crime rates for a given population group.

Economic hard times threaten the Area's funding for crime control and prevention. According to recent estimates, there are more than 3,500 licensed local police officers at work in the Seven-County Area. In addition, hundreds of other specialized investigative and enforcement officers work in the Area's federal and state agencies. In 1980, expenditures

in Metropolitan Area public safety exceeded \$150 million. This category of local public expenditure is surpassed only by spending on welfare and education.

Funds to support local law enforcement activities have traditionally come from local property taxes levied by cities and counties. However, recent cutbacks of state and federal revenue sharing have put severe pressure on this funding source. Many local officials have cut back on incremental increases for law enforcement services. Similar pressure is exerted on federal, state and local financial support for court operations and corrections.

In light of these severe budget limitations, local governments will have to develop management structures and methods that are even more productive than they are now. The need for cooperation and sharing of specialized personnel appears to be growing. In order to further prevent and control crime in the Twin Cities Area, it may be necessary for individuals, families and neighborhoods to take on more responsibility and to cooperate more fully with local law enforcement officers.

In this time of diminishing public resources, it may be necessary to concentrate crime prevention and control efforts on those offenses that pose the greatest threat to the community or cause the greatest human suffering. The current crime reporting system may be inappropriate as a tool for analyzing crime and allocating scarce resources. Current "objective" crime reporting by authorities to the public may give a distorted view of the crime problem.

The police Executive Research Foundation is currently experimenting with a new crime reporting method known as the "Crime Classification System." According to its proponents, the new method provides more information about human suffering inflicted on the crime victim.

The proposed new system incorporates the use of "seriousness scoring," which measures crimes according to the relative amount of human suffering experienced by the victim. This victim-oriented approach to reporting crime promises to be a useful tool in the allocation of scarce public law enforcement funds.

#### OPPORTUNITIES FOR COOPERATION

Local governments in the Twin Cities Area may well face the prospect of fighting a gradually increasing rate of crime in the 1980s with funding levels that will likely remain close to those of today. What can be done? Are there ways in which the crime-control effort can be made more effective without dramatically increasing funding levels?

Among other remedies, it may be helpful to view crime control and prevention from a metropolitan-wide perspective. From this vantage point, it may be possible to identify opportunities for sharing the limited financial and technical resources local governments need to control crime. Such cooperation can lead to sharing of successful strategies for solving local problems of crime prevention and control.

A recent report of the U.S. Attorney General's Task Force on Violent Crime lists 64 proposals for attacking crime in this country. Very few of these proposals called for spending money. Cooperation, according to FBI Director William H. Webster, is the nation's best weapon against crime.

If Webster is correct, people and their governments in the Twin Cities Area may be a step ahead of many other metropolitan areas. The Twin Cities Area currently enjoys a high degree of inter-governmental cooperation in many areas. To build upon that, the Metropolitan Council is eager to work with federal, state and local governments to strengthen overall cooperation in the battle against crime.

#### APPENDIX A: NOTES ABOUT THE CRIME DATA

#### UNIFORM CRIME REPORTING SYSTEM

Data in this report is supplied by the Uniform Crime Reporting Program unless otherwise designated. The program is a local, county and state law enforcement effort administered by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) since 1930. It gives a nationwide view of crime based on police statistics voluntarily submitted by law enforcement agencies throughout the country.

In 1972 Minnesota began collecting crime-related data as part of a computerized, statewide reporting program on criminal justice. Through Minnesota's crime reporting statutes, participating Minnesota law enforcement agencies are required to submit information as determined by the Bureau of Criminal Apprehension. Reported offenses are recorded by the municipality and county in which they occur, rather than by the agency that may investigate, arrest, or otherwise dispose of the case. Crime data and information submitted by municipal and county law enforcement agencies is collected on a daily and semi-daily basis under the Minnesota Criminal Justice Reporting Program.

#### SERIOUS CRIME INDEX

Only "Part I crimes" are included in this report. These refer to seven crimes chosen on the basis of their seriousness, frequency, and likelihood of being reported to the police. The crimes are: murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny-theft and motor-vehicle theft. These seven crimes, with the addition of arson, make up the Uniform Crime Reports Crime Index. The index serves as a measure for evaluating annual changes in the volume of crime.

The crime index is a single number obtained by adding together all incidents of each of these crimes. If more than one index offense occurs during a single incident, only the most serious is reported in the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) program and included in the crime index total. These index offenses are often called "Part I crimes," in reference to the original FBI two-part reporting form that separated offenses into Part I and Part II.

Some tables and figures in this report break down serious offenses into categories of "violent crimes" (i.e., crimes against a person) and "property crimes" (i.e., crimes against property). Thus, offenses such as murder, rape, robbery, and assault are violent crimes or crimes against a person. Burglary, larceny, and auto theft are property crimes, or crimes against property.

## CRIME RATES

Crime rates tell whether reported crime is increasing or decreasing and whether it is growing faster, slower, or at the same pace as the population. Rates can be constructed for specific crimes and for specific groups in the general population.
